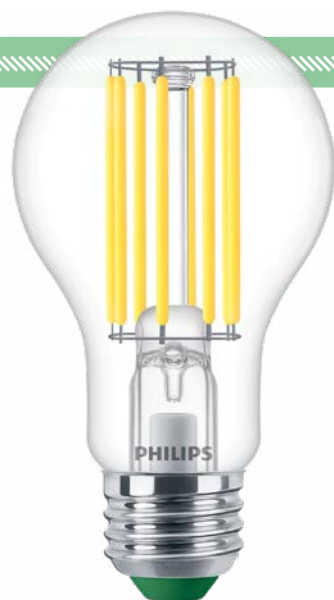




### Pretty organic bedding

### Sustainable baskets

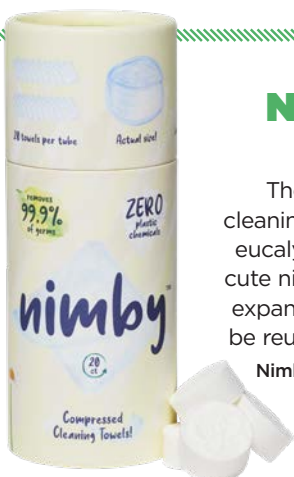
